Introducing!! Diane Bradshaw



My name is Diane Bradshaw and I became a member of the JAM Committee at the beginning of 2012. This year I have taken over responsibility for organising the Medal Tests on behalf of the JAM Committee.

I was first introduced to SCD in 2000, shortly after we came to live in New Zealand - by being invited along to dancing by one of the other 'school mums'. Having done tap dancing in the UK, I thought SCD might be

fun so I went along to try. Without this personal invitation I might never have tried SCD and I would have missed all the fun and friendship I have had over the past 13 years.

I began attending the Upper Hutt Club, somewhat erratically for the first couple of years but then became hooked, so I began attending the Lower Hutt Club too. I found I learned much more quickly when dancing twice a week and found Scottish Country Dancers very friendly and helpful.

I was invited to take part in demonstrations and remember feeling very nervous beforehand, but my partner was much more experienced and very supportive.

In 2007 I was part of a group invited to help friends, who were training to become teachers, to learn dances for their teaching exam. I learnt so much from being part of the process that I decided try it myself. So in 2008 I took over teaching the Lower Hutt Juniors and began training for my Teachers Certificate, which I passed at Summer School in Dunedin in 2010/11.

I really enjoy teaching the juniors and sharing my love of SCD with a new generation of dancers. I look forward to meeting many of you at JAM Camp in Christchurch in October this year.

Two Summer School Scholarships are awarded to JAMs each year. The Scholarship pays the full cost of a JAM resident at the New Zealand Summer School (any travel costs are extra). Applications close on 15 July and are drawn by the end of July.

Applications are particularly encouraged from junior dancers who might not otherwise be able to go to Summer School - whether due to financial constraints, because their family are not SCD dancers, or other reasons. What's happening in Scotland?

Although New Zealand Branch was one of the first to organize membership, events and classes specifically for youth dancers, the Royal Scottish Country Society, our parent organisation in Scotland, has been getting into the swing too. If you're travelling overseas, now or when you're older, you can attend the **Spring Fling** – this year's was in Manchester, 2014's will be held in Lyon, France. Scholarships are available from the Society to attend. **Youth Workshops** – planned to be held in January and October each year – are starting this October in Glasgow. The Society's **Summer School**, held in St Andrews, Scotland, for 4 weeks during

July and August every year, offers places to 12 to 15 year olds in Week 3. Scholarships are available for attendance by overseas dancers - Amy Luxton-Esler from Auckland has received a scholarship to attend the 2013 Summer School.

The Sassenach

The Sassenach is a fun dance to add to a dance program, to do as a demonstration or just to bring to your teacher as a suggestion for your club night! It is all about the 4th woman and her mission to find herself a partner by hook or by crook. It can be danced to any good 4x48 reel for example Earl of Mansfield. It is a dance for 3 couples plus one extra woman (who stands below 3M (i.e. in 4M place).

1-8 1st couple nearer hands joined dance down the centre, retaining nearer hands turn

inwards, cross hands and 1st man gives his spare right hand to the Sassenach and he leads BOTH women up to the top. Sassenach finishes in 1st man's place, 1st woman back in her place and 1st man in centre facing 1st woman. (Sassenach looking appreciatively at 1st man and 1st man looking delighted to have 2 partners)

9-16 1st man sets to and turns partner both hands, sets to and turns Sassenach both hands, flowing into

17-24 Reel of 3 across top of set (1st man giving left shoulder to his partner to begin).

It is a 6 bar reel for 1st couple. On bars 23 and 24, the Sassenach dances round 1st man's place and slightly down heading towards 2nd woman (*this needs to be phrased carefully*)

25-32 Sassenach turns 2^{nd} woman right hand (2), 2^{nd} man left hand (2), 3^{rd} woman right hand (2), 3^{rd} man left hand (2) - as she works her way down, to **finish** in the centre of the set

33-40 With Sassenach in the centre (her choice of steps or standing!), the other 3 couples dance 6 hands round and back (Sassenach is thinking what shall I do next? How do I hang onto this new partner of mine?)

41-48 (Sassenach "T've got it!") Sassenach dances to the top of the set (2), turns about to face down (2 pdb), collects 1st couple and all 3 dance down centre (2) (2nd and 3rd couple step up on 5 and 6), leaves 1st man in 3rd man's place, guides 1st woman across into 4th man's place and Sassenach finishes in 3rd woman's place opposite the former 1st man who is now 3rd man and is her partner.

Repeat with new Sassenach.

Waimate Shenanigans

On March 9, a group of 13 young Scottish Country dancers from Waimate in the South Island danced during the celebrations of their town's Edwardian Heritage Group's annual Promenade in the Park. This year's theme was 'Scotland in the South' and the girls and boys in the group enjoyed dressing up to perform 6 dances.

Unfortunately the first three dances were performed in the rain, and an hour later the dancers had to put back on their cold, soggy shoes to perform three more dances in a true Scotch mist! The children chose their favourite dances for the occasion - Happy to Meet, Kingston Flyer, Circle of Cheer,

Domino 5, A Jig for Mrs Dunn and Cumberland Reel.

Some of the children have been learning for four years and some others for two, but one of the girls only started dancing at the end of last year and this was her first display. In spite of the yucky weather they danced well and the audience appreciated their efforts and positive spirit. (Report from Hazel Fish)
