I doubt I could choose a favourite, but "A New Leaf," devised by one of our class, was an interesting dance which deservingly became

our ceilidh item. Over the course of the week we learnt new steps and formations and tried out dances that none of us had done before. Once we had to dance without using hands, and another time we were challenged to act sluggish and immobile—making for an amusing version of the Farguharson 50. Thank you, Diana for making our class both challenging and enjoyable, we definitely learnt a lot.

On some of the afternoons I went along to the optional Highland and Ladies step classes. Apart from completely melting in the heat, these were a lot of fun, and a great chance to learn some new steps. Hogmanay was probably my favourite night, but I was very glad we had New Year's Day off since many of us did not make it to bed until early that morning. The mock court was also hilarious, although I don't recommend ever dancing the Petronella backwards... It was great to be able to dance to live music all week, so thank you to all the musicians, with a special thank you to Anne-Marie who put up with our weird class requests to "start from bar 29!"

For the dance we were performing at the ceilidh, I suggested a dance that I had devised myself, as did Jack, one of my classmates. His dance, A New Leaf, was the one that was chosen, and I'm glad since I actually preferred it over mine. That ceilidh, and in fact all the evening dances, were accompanied by live music, which was simply spectacular. We had Wild Heather performing most evenings, but sometimes we were instead joined by Iain Matcham on the fiddle and Jason Morris on the keyboard.

I learned so much, and the privilege of being able to bring my newfound knowledge back to my local club is something truly special. My feet are glad that it's over, but the rest of me can't wait for the next one.

RSCDS Youth Leadership Award

The RSCDS Youth Leadership Award is for young dancers aged 12 and upwards through the teenage years. Those interested will need to talk to their teacher first.

Below are the requirements for achieving this award:

Social and Ceilidh Dances: Learn dances which are often included in a Party Programme.

Communication Skills: Assist the teacher with practical aspects of a class of younger dancers, while getting to know the children. **Teaching/Leadership**: Help with technique, formations and dances in a class of younger dancers.

Music: Understand the difference between jigs, reels and strathspeys; be able to count and clap in time; choose appropriate music for the devised dance.

Creativity: Devise a dance of 32 bars, independently or with others, using well known steps and basic formations; choose the number of dancers and shape of the set.


Participation: Attend an adult class occasionally to appreciate the social benefits to dancers of all ages.

Diary: Each participant is required to keep a record of details of participation and responses over a one year period including evidence such as photos and dance programmes.

JAM Forum - Nelson January 2019

The following topics were discussed:

Medal test review - The dances for the tests have been reviewed and some new dances added at each level. The new syllabus will be examined for the first time at this year's JAM camp in Auckland.

<u>Spring Fling style class</u> at the Cambridge Summer School. This is a high energy class that will appeal to senior JAMs.

<u>Dancing Achievement Awards (DAA)</u> - these are like Medal Tests but for older JAMs and adults. Auckland dancers should keep a look out for these being run in your region during 2019.

RSCDS Youth Leadership Award - Hazel Fish talked about how this had been implemented at the Waimate Club. Read more about it elsewhere in this newsletter.
