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Try a New Dance

During Summer School 2019/2020 the High Energy class devised some new dances. They had to include certain formations or progressions but each turned out differently! Why don't you ask your teacher to try this one:

Gender Bender

A 32 bar strathspey for 3 couples in a longwise set

Bars:

1-8: 1s set, turn with RH, cast one place and turn to the top LH.

9-12: 1s and 3s dance half figure of 8 around 2s (1s casting to begin).

13-16: 1s and 3s change on side with LH, and turn into allemande hold RH, *while*, 2s turn once RH into allemande hold. Finish 321

17-24: All 3 couples dance a 3 couple allemande.

25-32: 1s and 2s dance half diamond pousette 1s and 3s dance half diamond pousette.

N.B. All men must dance on the "ladies" side.

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


Create Your Own Tartan Competition


Included in this newsletter are 3 different designs of tartan that you can colour however you like. You could also design your own! Get colouring!
