From the Branch

Practical IT assistance for Regions and Clubs

One of the suggestions raised by members in a recent survey was that the Branch might offer assistance to regions and clubs on technical issues, such as website development and the latest trends in the use of recorded music.

While the Branch does not plan to provide a formal service, there is no doubt that there is considerable expertise among our 700-plus members and other dancers, and perhaps we could exploit this knowledge for the benefit of the Branch at large. With this in mind, if you have particular computing skills that you are willing to share with others, we invite you to register your interest via itcoord@dancescottish.org.nz.

We are just 'testing the water' at this stage, but we would also like to hear from anyone who is *seeking* advice. This will help us to determine whether or not the initiative is worth pursuing.

Donations and bequests

The New Zealand Branch has a fund, called the Memorial Fund, which was set up for the primary purpose of bringing to New Zealand an examiner from the RSCDS headquarters, at regular intervals. It can also be used for other purposes to maintain the high standard of dancing in New Zealand. Regions, clubs and individuals donate to this fund in the memory of Mildred Clancey and other members of the Scottish Country Dancing movement in New Zealand.

The Branch has also received several substantial bequests, the most recent being from the late dancer and administrator, Bernice Kelly. Bernice was a longstanding member of the Wellington and Island Bay Clubs, and was President of the Wellington Region Committee from 2006 to 2010. She specified that the money should be used for education and training purposes.

Work being undertaken by the Education and Training Coordinator, Jeanette Watson, will form a foundation on which to base planning for activities that will use these financial resources over the coming years, for the benefit of dancers, teachers and musicians.

Education and Training

Unit 2 Examinations held

The RSCDS Teaching Certificate is a multi-year endeavour for those who want to learn and practise teaching skills to a high level, and to challenge themselves in their dancing and teaching. There are five 'units', testing candidates' theoretical knowledge, own

dancing ability, basic teaching, teaching practice and advanced teaching. Six candidates for Unit 2 (Own Dancing) were put through their paces over the Matariki weekend (24-26 June 2022), culminating in taking their exam on a chilly Sunday morning. We wish them all luck with the results, due out soon.

Grateful thanks to Margaret Cantwell, Alison Trotter, Lesley Campbell, Diane Bradshaw and Catherine McCutcheon, who all put themselves up as the 'extras' needed to make up the set (some of them at very short notice!); to examiners Debbie Roxburgh and Doug Mills, tutor Ruth Budden and musician Sharlene Penman for supporting our candidates through the process; and to Capital City club for morning and afternoon tea supplies throughout.

Register of Teachers

For a number of years, there have been various attempts to record the qualifications, experience and activity of teachers in New Zealand. This would be of huge benefit in advising Regions and Summer Schools about teacher experience and availability, planning teacher development, communicating with those interested in SCD teaching, and understanding the 'health' and continuity of our SCD teaching fraternity. I'm going to have another go at this, with an online form to be launched soon – watch this space.

unique sound of the accordion adds a completely different quality to the band as a whole.

In these trying times, it's good to know that NZ's SCD musicians are a co-operative bunch. If there's a gap to be filled, usually someone can be found to willingly help out. Often it's almost seamless, as we've played together previously in other groupings and can adapt and mesh with each other.

But there's a **But**: nobody lives forever. New blood is needed – to learn the ropes from the old hands and gain live experience in a mentored environment, so that the traditions can continue. Perhaps you would like to explore the art of playing for SCD for yourself? Or perhaps you have a non-dancing family member or friend who you'd like to include in your dancing activity?

So – where to begin? Contacting me, or any of the band leaders on the website, is a good start. We're a friendly bunch! I'm running monthly mentoring sessions in Wellington, resulting in playing for a few dances on a club night (thank you, Capital City Club!). At Labour Weekend, the annual Musicians' Weekend at Matangi (near Hamilton) will include a special try-it-and-see session on Sunday morning. And next year, I am hoping to extend my training activities into the South Island. Watch this space!

A major opportunity for potential and active SCD musicians is available at Summer School: the Musicians' Class (run in the afternoons) provides practical experience in playing in a band, technical help with your instrument, and an introduction to the people and fun of our world. The cost is included in your School fee, so you can dance in the mornings and play in the afternoons. Great value!

I'm looking forward to seeing you in a band sometime, somewhere.

SCD at Otago University

Close your eyes and imagine... a beginners' class, everyone is fit, able, young(ish), keen, with good hearing. Some music is played (eight bars), a step is shown, everyone tries – pretty good – a teaching point is made, all try again. They have clearly heard and understood the teaching point, the dancing is better. Another teaching point. Further improvement, now a formation. Wow, they got it. One more point, repeat and it is looking very nice indeed, add another formation... Need to keep a close eye on the time as we are very much working to the clock.

This may sound like the strange (and possibly mythical) parallel universe known as Teacher Training Unit 3, but in fact it is the Otago Region Beginners' Class at Otago University Students' Association (OUSA). The Otago Region decided to use the Branch \$1,000 "Put some Zing in to Dancing" grant to try to connect again with Otago University, which, in the past, has been a source of SCD in Otago.

The Region had decided to be flexible in offering to meet the costs of classes, schools and club nights for students, depending on what interest there was. A meeting arranged with the Dean of Performing Arts (SCD once came from Phys Ed, but dance is now firmly an art) led to an opportunity to talk to dance students, and also the suggestion to talk to OUSA about offering a course.

FDR (President Roosevelt) once said that "we have nothing to fear but fear itself". Very true — earlier discussions in the Region about presenting SCD at Orientation week had hit the wall of "only OUSA affiliated groups can take part" — oh no, that is obviously impossible. When contacted, OUSA were delighted to be able to offer SCD classes. Quite a lot of forms to fill in, but we were welcomed service providers, not irritating outsiders. What is more, those who register expect to pay, for the whole course, in advance; and the teachers get paid! Yes! I am now a professional dance teacher! (even get KiwiSaver) — time to update my CV.

So to recap, we have been able to offer beginners' courses (five weeks each, two streams each semester) at no cost to the Region. The Branch funding is used to allow anyone from the OUSA course to continue dancing at Club by covering club night fees, and if interested, at a day class or perhaps a contribution to a school. So far we have run two streams and had eight dancers attending each.

The conversion rate to club nights has been two per stream. The impact on club nights of two young dancers on any night has been amazing. It doesn't matter that exams, holidays, other commitments and then leaving Dunedin will take them away. They leave with the joy of SCD, we benefit from their energy and enthusiasm and next semester there will be another group ...

Thank you to the Branch for providing the financial basis to allow us to do this with confidence – we didn't know how cheap it would be when we started!
